This project was timely and much appreciated as many of the areas we live in have (or are about to enact) bag taxes/bring-your-own-bag (BYOB) policies. The bag features French seams, gussets, and a pocket that holds the folded bag for stowing when not in use. Holly made kits for all of us (including needles!) and had her snap press on hand to finish off the pockets. Now we are all prepared to BYOB!

**Stephanie** is working on espadrilles from fabric she wove!

Stephanie discussed having someone take a silhouette of you and have the picture printed out so you can draw on it. It allows you to experiment with necklines, horizontal and vertical prints, etc. Stephanie brought in her croquis to show how she used it to test style, length of dresses and skirts

#### MARYLAND CYBER SEWISTS

Note: Since all of our Cyber Sewist meetings are recorded with links in GroupWorks, I decided to include where on each recording some of the topics highlighted here are located [h:mm:ss] for easy reference in case readers would like to see specific segments in more detail.

The Cyber Sewists' **October** meeting featured a discussion of topics of interest for future meetings, such as elastics, interfacing, purses, community service projects, and various ideas for sewing challenges. Helen D [10:00] alerted us to a YouTube video on the history of patterns that is similar to a presentation she did for us. It was not, as she feared, a pirated copy of hers but another woman's version [See Caroline Martin's The History of the Sewing Pattern Industry] which complements Helen's very nicely.








Our Sew and Tell segment included Jackie C [36:40] who finished her top-down, center-out pants from the Jennifer Stern workshop (muslin #4 [42:22] has a beautiful lining), and is working on an Advent Calendar and Christmas stocking for the holidays. Lorraine R [43:33] finished her white seersucker top just in time for her annual September trip to the beach.







Helen D [48:05] is crocheting multiple knit hats on a circular loom, an activity that she feels justifies hours of TV watching. And Kathryn F [53:32] fulfilled her 2023 goal by making a pair of wide-legged cargo pants with a fly front and no elastic.

In **November**, the Cyber Sewists hosted Jennifer Georgia, who delighted us with her Costuming 101 discussion. She was currently directing and costuming an imagined sequel to Jane Austen's <u>Pride and Prejudice</u>, titled <u>Christmas at Pemberley</u>, so her focus was on period costuming. She uses pattern software, electric scissors and pattern weights to size patterns up and make them quickly. She also has done historical reproductions as they would have been made originally, and included in her presentation a short video on how an 18<sup>th</sup> century woman would have gotten dressed [42:55]. But primarily she described many of the unique challenges inherent in

theatrical costuming, including quick changes, use of stage blood (!), regular cleaning and mending, and overall durability of a costume that must hold up for multiple performances.

Our **December** meeting was devoted to updates on our personal sewing goals for 2023.

Kathryn F [1:55] had met her goal by making a pair of cargo pants with a fly front in October, so she went ahead to make a 2<sup>nd</sup> pair just to be sure. Lorraine R [5:12] did not, again this year, make from scratch a pair of comfortable, wearable-in-public pants, BUT she replaced the elastic in three pairs of black rtw stretch pants, thereby returning them to her usable wardrobe from the mending pile where they have been languishing for several years.







Debbie M [11:40] did clean up her sewing room but also made a wearable button-down shirt from a sloper that she found in her stash. Cynthia I [18:30] wanted to reorganize her sewing room without buying additional bins and she did – by downsizing to a new smaller house and giving away LOTS of her stash that wouldn't fit there. Janet C [22:05] finally finished an intricate embroidery square that she started in 2020 (!), and began using neckties as appliques for a rooster-loving friend whose father had died. Jennifer G [27:55] already has her new goal: make a period garment using only her antique machines – an 1883 hand-crank machine, an 1893 chain stitch machine, and a 1903 treadle machine.









For Sew and Tell, Cynthia I [35:00] is making several cross-body bags for her sister-in-law to give as gifts, all from cut up jeans, after receiving one herself as a gift from Cynthia. Lesson: be careful what you give as gifts – they may multiply! Ivalyn A [49:25] showed the 3-fabric blouse she made at the recent ASG retreat, and showed photos [51:53] of two wedding outfits she embellished: a dress for a bride and a jacket for a groom (separate weddings). She also gave rave reviews [59:45] for the Ann Lowe gowns currently on exhibit at Winterthur in PA. And finally, Janet C [33:55] showed a photo [42:52] of a stunning quilt of Harriet Tubman she saw at the African American Museum in DC, and another photo [44:43] of a necktie applique pillow that she made.

Our next meeting will be **Thursday, January 4, 2024, at 7:00pm on-line**, at which we will commit to our personal sewing goals for the new year, and we'll discuss topics of interest, and perhaps adopt a group challenge for the coming meetings.

Helen K showed 10 hats in assorted colors that she knit for charity


Anita wore linen pants she sewed from Louise Cutting fabric.

Sara wore a scarf she sewed of fine fabric off the \$2.97 table at G Street.


Susan brought two pillows she made from quilt blocks she finished years ago. She did cording and a zipper with hidden flap.

Susan wore a handknit sweater she made from a kit.


































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
